

Life as a parent is always an adventure. And life as a parent of a young adult with Down syndrome is no different. This month our family was fortunate to share experiences with other parents and learn from leading experts in all aspects of raising a child with Down syndrome

The National Down Syndrome Congress held its annual convention in Indianapolis July 11-13. This was our first time attending a national conference, and I highly recommend the experience to all families. It was an amazing opportunity to hear about groundbreaking research on cognition, genetics, and Alzheimer's disease; national advocacy efforts on education and jobs; and the latest on medical issues surrounding Down syndrome. But more importantly for me, it was a time to celebrate the many achievements of individuals with Down syndrome. Watching the hundreds of babies, children, teens, and adults with Down syndrome throughout the convention space was a breathtaking moment. It brought me back to the days when Payten was young and I was so intent on when he would walk and talk; through the middle years and the angst of inclusionary school opportunities; and into the new world of job opportunities and adult life. I even broached the future and attended a workshop on how to transition "caregiving" to the next generation after a parent is no longer able to take care of their child.
